Cheslyn Hay Sport and Community High School Pupil Premium Report September 2016

Overview

The Pupil Premium was introduced in 2011, and is paid by means of a specific grant for those pupils registered as eligible for Free School Meals in reception to Year 11 or those who are looked after by the Local Authority. A premium was also introduced for children whose parents are currently serving in the armed forces. The Pupil Premium gives schools extra funding to raise the attainment of disadvantaged pupils from reception to year 11 and is allocated to:

- all children eligible for free school meals at any point in the past 6 years
- children who have been looked after for 6 months or longer

In the 2016 to 2017 financial year, funding for the pupil premium has remained at the same level as for 2015-2016 and schools are receiving:

- £1,320 per pupil of primary-school age
- £935 per pupil of secondary-school age
- £300 per service child
- £1,900 per pupil for looked-after children who:
 - have been looked after for 1 day or more
 - are adopted
 - leave care under a Special Guardianship Order or a Residence Order

Objectives

In this school, the Pupil Premium funding will be used to:

- Provide additional educational support to improve the progress and to raise the standard of achievement for these pupils
- Narrow and close the gap between the progress and achievement of these pupils and their peers
- As far as its powers allow, to address any underlying inequalities between children eligible for Pupil Premium and others

We will ensure that the additional funding reaches the pupils who need it most and that it makes a significant impact on their education and lives.

School Policy

The Head teacher and Governing Body have agreed a policy for Pupil Premium to guide the use of funding and to ensure it represents value for money. This is available on the school website. The school contact is Graham Clegg (Deputy Head teacher) for further details.

Statistics

- In September 2016 we currently have 193 pupils for whom the school will receive the additional funding
- In the financial year 2015-2016 the school received £176,080 of Pupil Premium funding
- In the current financial year 2016-2017 the school has received a total of £178,550
 Pupil Premium funding to date

Strategies for 2016-2017

The school has identified the needs of those pupils receiving Pupil Premium funding and reviewed the strategies that have been used in the last three years. As a result of this, we have decided to use funding for the following intervention strategies in 2016-2017:

- Employ a literacy mentor and a numeracy mentor to raise levels in numeracy and literacy of all Pupil Premium students
- Continue with the corrective reading programme
- Additional clerical support focussed on analysing data and coordinating intervention strategies for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Extend the before and after school homework classes with SSA support for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- TLR responsibilities for teaching staff to work with pupils entitled to Pupil Premium; Challenging Destinies, Raising Aspirations, Intervention and Parental Engagement
- Provide designated time for Heads of Year to use data to track, identify and intervene
 with pupils in their year group entitled to Pupil Premium Pupil
- Learning Mentors to work with pupils entitled to Pupil Premium to help to remove barriers to learning resulting from behavioural and emotional issues.
- Support for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium to attend appropriate alternative education courses.
- Additional time for the attendance officer and Learning Mentors to track and target intervention at an early stage.
- Additional teaching staff in English and maths to support pupils entitled to Pupil Premium and provide small group work
- Provided programmes of 1 to 1 tuition
- Provide financial support towards other costs e.g. music tuition, trips, uniform etc. for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Pupil premium KIT walks
- Pupil premium calendared intervention meetings and questionnaires (register)
- Specialist teachers on key target groups in Year 7.

All our work through the Pupil Premium will be aimed at accelerating progress moving pupils entitled to Pupil Premium funding to at least age related expectations. Initially this will concentrate on Numeracy and Literacy.

Review of 2015-2016 Pupil Premium Strategies

Our additional funding in 2015-2016 was £176,080. This was spent on targeted intervention strategies that:

- Provided small group work for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium funding with experienced teachers focussed on overcoming gaps in learning to help them make improved progress and to raise their standards of achievement
- Provided 1:1 support for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium funding to help them make improved progress and to raise their standards of achievement
- Continued employing numeracy and literacy mentors to support pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Appointed additional teaching staff in English and maths to support pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Provided additional teaching and learning opportunities for pupils entitled to Pupil
 Premium support at various times throughout the year
- Continued with additional clerical support to provide data and coordinate intervention strategies for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium

- Extended before and after school homework classes for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium with SSA support
- Continued the role within the teaching staff (Challenging Destinies) to oversee pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Continued the designated time for Heads of Year to work with pupils entitled to Pupil Premium Pupil
- Provided financial support towards other costs e.g. music tuition, trips, uniform etc. for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium
- Continued with support from additional Learning Mentors to work with pupils entitled to Pupil Premium to help to remove barriers to learning resulting from behavioural and emotional issues.
- Supported pupils entitled to Pupil Premium attending alternative education courses
- Continued to improve attendance for pupils entitled to Pupil Premium through a full time attendance officer and have targeted intervention through the learning mentors

Evidence of Impact Key Stage 3

- The majority of pupils entitled to Pupil Premium on the corrective reading programme made at least six months progress in their reading
- Through the 1 to 1 intervention programme in English and maths, all pupils entitled to Pupil Premium made at least one level of progress
- Attendance has improved for the vast majority of pupils entitled to Pupil Premium (1%)

Key Stage 4

- Pupil Premium students achieving 3 levels of progress in Maths has improved by 10% on last year.
- Pupil Premium students achieving 4 levels of progress in Maths has improved by 2% on last year.
- Pupil Premium students' progress 8 measure improved by 0.05 on last year.
- The value added measure for Pupil Premium students in Maths and Science has improved.
- The gap between Pupil Premium and non Pupil Premium students has closed on the measure of students gaining 5 A-C including English and Maths.

Summary

In the fifth year of additional Pupil Premium funding the evidence gathered through the school's self-evaluation strategy has shown that some of the intervention strategies have had some success and have had a positive impact on the progress, standards and achievement of those pupils entitled to the additional funds.
